### January 9th-The Baptism of the Lord



Today, we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord! The origin and foundation of Christian Baptism is Jesus. Before starting his public ministry, Jesus submitted himself to the baptism given by John the Baptist. The waters did not purify him; he cleansed the waters. "He comes to sanctify the Jordan for our sake . . . to begin a new creation through the Spirit and water" (St. Gregory Nazianzen, Liturgy of the Hours, I, 634). Jesus' immersion in the water is a sign for all human beings of the need to die to themselves to do God's will. Jesus did not need to be baptized because he was totally faithful to the will of his Father and free from sin. However, he wanted to show his solidarity with human beings in order to reconcile them to the Father. By commanding his disciples to baptize all nations, he established the means by which people would die to sin—Original and actual—and begin to live a new life with God.

### Discern-Decide-Do

Discern-Decide-Do is the process for turning our resolutions into realities. Since the 1500's, this "3-D Approach" to the discernment process has helped millions of people to prayerfully ask Jesus and have Him help them answer their questions about career choices, religious vocations, educational opportunities, marital status, job changes, geographic moves, and retirement.

This 500-years old, Scripture-based, Christ-focused discernment and decision-making process will be the topic of the Adult Prayer Enrichment Program for Winter 2022.

The class starts on Tuesday, January 18, 2022, and ends seven weeks later on March 1, 2022. The class meets once a week in the Cordis Center from 10:15-11:30 am. January 11, 2022 is the final registration deadline. Pre-registration is required.

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I have the privilege and pleasure of serving as the Bishop of the Wheeling-Charleston Diocese. It is likewise my joy to cooperate with Pope Francis in promoting the welfare of the Church and the mission of all its members to bring Christ to others and others to Christ.

The Pope has asked us all to participate in what he calls a “synodal process” in our parishes, institutions and in other group settings.

What is a “synodal process?” It is basically an assembly that discusses matters of importance for our living of the Christian faith. The term “synod” was used in the ancient Church when bishops met about issues particular to their times. Since the last Ecumenical Council of the Catholic Church, -- Vatican II (1962-1965) – there have been meetings every two or three years of a Synod of Bishops, representatives of the world’s bishops’ conferences, to discuss various topics.

What Pope Francis is asking of us is that, prior to the next Synod of Bishops in Rome (fall, 2023), we engage in our local dioceses in a synodal process so that, when the bishops gather in Rome to discuss the synodal dimension of Church life, they may have a clearer view of how our people are experiencing the Catholic faith. It is a “bottoms up” approach rather than a “top down” one.

The three key elements of the synodal meetings in our parishes and other groups are: communion, participation and mission. Communion means that we seek together the light of the Holy Spirit, who, according to Jesus’ promise, leads us into all truth [John 16:13]. We respect what the Spirit has led the Church to understand in the past regarding faith and morals but we now ask the Spirit to help us see what we need to know about contemporary matters. So, communion is characterized first of all by prayer, individually and as a group, and then by respectful listening as members of the group speak. Speakers must be allowed to speak uninterruptedly and without fear but they must also remember that they are not there to air personal grievances or score points but to contribute their insights to a gathering of believers jointly seeking the truth for the good of the Church.

Participation means casting a wide net to offer as many people as possible the opportunity to contribute the wisdom gained from their experience of faith. Not only parish groups, but college students, youth groups, the clients of Catholic Charities, residents of nursing homes and assisted living facilities, Catholics who are disaffected from the Church and members of the West Virginia Council of Churches, among other groups, will be invited to take part.

As for mission, this is the goal of the synodal process. Mission is what the Lord Jesus wants us to do: Go make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you [Matthew 28:19-20]. We must be committed to inviting back those Catholics who no longer walk with us in faith and to inviting the many West Virginians who have no religious affiliation whatsoever to follow Christ with us. The synodal process must motivate us to reach out to our neighbor with faith and love or it will be sound and fury signifying nothing [William Shakespeare, Macbeth].

As the Pope and the bishops gathered with him in Rome in 2023 will reflect on the contributions from Catholics and friends from around the world, so I hope to find in your discussions ideas and recommendations to foster the mission of our Diocese. We cannot stand pat while a field of grain needs harvesting. We must act boldly to share our faith with others while enhancing our family life in the Church.

I am grateful to you for your interest in this synodal process. It speaks of your love for the Lord and for your Church. Let us keep the intention of a fruitful synodal process in our daily prayers. May the Lord Jesus, with the intercession of Mary, Mother of the Church, and St. Joseph, patron of our Diocese, guide us through his Holy Spirit to the fullness of truth and life.

### January 9, 2022-In You I Am Well Pleased

Today's readings: Isaiah 42, 1–4 or Isaiah 40:1–5, 9–11; Psalm 29:1–2, 3–4, 3, 9–10 or Psalm 104:1b–2, 3–4, 24–25, 27–28, 29–30; Acts 10:34–38 or Titus 2:11–14, 3:4–7; Luke 3:15–16, 21–22. John the Baptist pointed away from himself and toward Jesus. He spoke God's Word to the people and baptized those who came to him, but he knew that he was not the messiah, the one who will baptize "with the holy Spirit and fire." And then one day, Jesus came to him to be baptized.

The heavens opened and the Spirit came down in the form of a dove. "You are my Beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." The Holy Spirit descended bodily, making Jesus ready for his public ministry. What joy John must have felt to see the fulfillment of God's promises to him and to the people of Israel! It was the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, in which he preached the kingdom of God but also revealed it in everything that he did.

On the day of our baptism, we receive the same Holy Spirit that descended on Jesus two thousand years ago. It is the beginning of our own vocation to reveal the kingdom of God in our words and our actions: to be like Jesus. How is God calling you today? You are God's beloved child, in whom God is well pleased. How will you carry the joy of that revelation into your life beyond the Christmas season?

## This Week and Beyond

### January 10—March 1-Ordinary Time

The word ordinary can feel like a synonym for "boring," but Ordinary Time is far from it. This season takes its name from the ordinal numbers (first, second, third, fourth, fifth, and so on) that are used to count the Sundays and the weeks that follow them. While the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter have a certain importance in the liturgical year, that does not diminish Ordinary Time. Consider that as the priest prepares the paschal candle at the Easter Vigil, he states, "All time belongs to him." How might you use this season to grow closer to God?

### January 18–25-Prayer for Christian Unity

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity spans an octave, or eight-day observance, a time frame that lends significance to the week. It is a great sorrow to be separated from our brothers and sisters in Christ, unable to join around the Eucharistic table together to "do this in memory of me." We wait in hope in a special way during this week for the day when all divisions among Christians will cease.

### January 25-Conversion of St. Paul

This feast commemorates the day when Saul, an observant young Jewish man who opposed the early Christians and even participated in the stoning death of St. Stephen, had an encounter with the risen Jesus. Saul, also known as Paul, left behind his former life to become an apostle to the gentiles. To preach the Gospel, you might offer forgiveness and mercy to someone who is not sorry, serve a meal at a soup kitchen with a joyful heart, or drop off a box of diapers at a place that serves mothers and children. Today's readings: Acts 22: 3–6 or Acts 9:1–22; Psalm 117:1bc, 2; Mark 16:15–18.

### January 28-St. Thomas Aquinas

Known as the angelic doctor, St. Thomas Aquinas was a Dominican priest whose writings are essential to the way we understand what we believe. He was a great theologian and philosopher, engaging with the intellectual currents of his day as well as those of ancient philosophy. St. Thomas described the beatific vision, unending happiness and union with God, as the goal of human life. Today's readings: 2 Samuel 11:1–4a, 5–10a, 13–17; Psalm 51: 3–4, 5–6a, 6bcd–7, 10–11; Mark 4:26–34.

### January 31-St. John Bosco

St. John Bosco was an Italian priest who worked to improve the lives of young people who lived in poverty. He went into the world to encounter the young people who had traveled to the city to try to find a better life but were living in abject poverty and unsafe conditions. He began many initiatives and organizations to assist children and was the founder of a religious congregation. Today's readings: 2 Samuel 15:13–14, 30, 16:5–13; Psalm 3:2–3, 4–5, 6–7; Mark 5:1–20.

### February 2-The Presentation of the Lord

This feast, forty days after Christmas, is traditionally a time to bring candles to church to be blessed. In Luke's account of the Gospel, we hear Simeon proclaim Jesus "a light for revelation to the Gentiles and glory for your people Israel." The Gospel according to John is also a source of the imagery of light associated with Jesus. Anna and Simeon watched and waited for the light throughout their lives. At times, it can be difficult to wait for what we most hope for. Watching and waiting for the light, we can unite ourselves with the waiting of Anna and Simeon. What desires of your heart are you still waiting to have fulfilled? You might decorate a tealight holder and light the candle to remind you to wait in hope. Today's readings: Malachi 3:1–4, Psalm 24:7, 8, 9, 10; Hebrews 2:14–18; Luke 2: 22–40.
