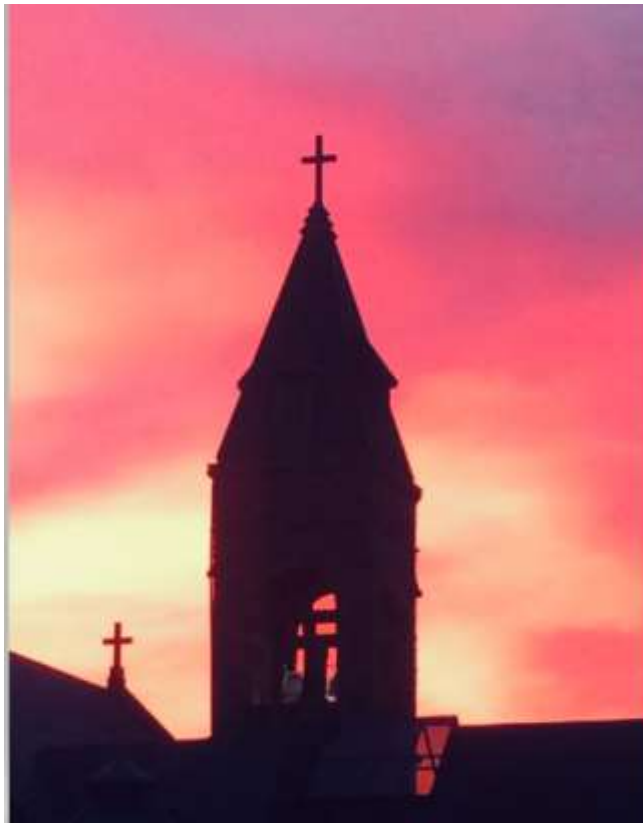

Advance Medical Directives: Planning for Your Future

Human life is good and to be protected. All medical decisions ought to reflect this core belief. Yet some medical and legal documents used to define a patient’s future care can be harmful. No matter how well-crafted, they can’t predict all the possible scenarios and best courses of action. In each set of circumstances, we need to judge whether a given treatment will provide real benefit to the patient, without causing harm or disproportionate burdens. The safest option is to designate a health care agent to make decisions if you become incapable of doing so. It’s best to appoint a responsible, trustworthy person who understands and shares your Catholic values, and can apply them when the need arises.

All Hallows' Day, the Solemnity of All Saints, or All Saints' Day is a celebration of all Catholic saints held on November 1 each year. "On this solemnity, we recall the holy men and women who, having completed their earthly journeys, now live forever with God. These saints, though not canonized, offer us models of abiding faith and love of God and neighbor" (Essential Guide to Seasons and Saints, 109).

In the Catholic Church, we are called to imitate and venerate saints because of their heroically virtuous lives, martyrdom, or their offering of life for others. But, what does veneration mean and why do we pray to the saints?

Veneration of the saints fosters our faith in God and does not detract from it. Rather, our faith in God is strengthened by our relationship with our brothers and sisters in the faith who are in heaven. The Church teaches that by imitating the virtues lived by the saints, the saints brings us closer to Christ. When we ask the saints to pray for us, we ask them to join their wills with the will of God and intercede for us here on earth. This is the Communion of Saints which we profess every Sunday in the Creed.

The Solemnity of All Saints—November 1—is a Holy Day of Obligation

The 31st Sunday, Ordinary Time-B Cycle-2006 - (Father Sadie, 304.546.4330)

This Saturday evening, I will have the privilege to be part of a program honoring my good friend, Rabbi Victor Urecki of B'Nai Jacob Synagogue. With that in mind, I would like to speak today of the Jewishness of Jesus.

Jesus' commandment to love God and neighbor is frequently held up as the distinctive feature of Jesus' teaching, a feature which makes Christianity different from Judaism. Incorrectly I must say, many contrast Christian love with what they describe as Jewish legalism.

Today's readings lead us to reflect on the Jewishness of Jesus, the Jewishness of His teaching and even the Jewishness of the scribe, His partner in dialogue.

All the ancient sources, especially the Four Gospels make clear that Jesus lived in the land of Israel, what we call the Holy Land. He and His first disciples were Jews. Most of His earthly ministry was directed toward His own Jewish people. The parables, wisdom sayings, prophetic oracles in which He expressed His teachings were thoroughly Jewish. His teachings about the Kingdom of God, concern for the poor, wise and righteous behavior and so forth, had their roots in Israel's Scriptures. The question, "Which is the first of all the commandments?" was asked of other Jewish teachers at that time. While Shammai dismissed the question, Hillel answered very similarly to Jesus' words; "What is hateful to you, do not do to your neighbor." Jesus' response, thoroughly Jewish, consists of two quotations from the Jewish Scriptures.

The first one, "Shema," you just heard; it is the kernel of Jewish daily prayer from antiquity to today. "Hear, O Israel! The Lord, our God, is the Lord alone. You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength."

The second quotation is part of the Jewish Holiness code: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." This is a thoroughly Jewish answer to a thoroughly Jewish question. Jesus' double-love commandment is good, solid, sound Jewish teaching. Its originality lies in Jesus bringing together and highlighting two passages from the Jewish source par excellence.

The scribe in today's Gospel is obviously Jewish. But we need to pay more attention, I think, to the identity and conduct of this religious leader entering into dialogue with Jesus.

As a scribe, he was a theologian and a lawyer, versed in Jewish Scripture and Law. The scribes were generally hostile to Jesus, His opponents in debate. Not this scribe. He is not hostile. He asks an honest question and then expresses agreement with Jesus' answer. He then adds that loving God and neighbor is worth more than offering holocausts and material sacrifices in worshipping the God of Israel.

My point today: the love commandment is not unique to Christianity, and to dismiss Judaism as pure legalism is to distort and caricature the Hebrew Scriptures and the Jewish Tradition.

Reflection on today's Gospel shows that the Christian double-love commandment comes from a Jewish teacher, is based on two quotations from Jewish Scripture and is affirmed by the Jewish scribe for whom Jesus shows respect and affection.

My friends in Christ, one of the great achievements of the Second Vatican Council was its call for a new, more positive relationship between the Catholic Church and the Jewish people. While there have been bumps in the road during the last 40 years, this relationship has been one of the Council's successes.

Mutual efforts along the way have made many Christians and Jews realize how much we have in common both in our past and in our present. Jesus' words today, from the Books of Deuteronomy and Leviticus, help us see this clearly and inspire us to walk together toward greater union with God and one another.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS - 1961-1978 A TRANSFORMED CHURCH

The early 1960s marked a period of transformation and upheaval for the Church and society, as the Second Vatican Council convened, and the civil rights movement emerged in full force.

At the 1966 Supreme Convention, Supreme Knight John W. McDevitt said it was time to see the Order as more than just "a fortress" for its members in a world hostile to the Catholic faith. In revising its admission policies and supporting several social justice initiatives, the Order took positive steps to eliminate racial discrimination.

During this time, the Order's insurance program began a period of dramatic growth. The amount of insurance in force tripled from \$1 billion to \$3 billion from 1960 to 1975. And in 1969, the Knights built its seventh national headquarters, its current location, to better serve the Order's members and their families.



1961: On Oct. 11, 1961, Supreme Knight Hart visited President John F. Kennedy — the first Catholic president — in the White House. Kennedy, a Fourth Degree Knight, reportedly greets Hart by saying, "Hello, Chief."

1963: In the spring of 1963, Hart attends a special White House meeting of religious leaders to discuss civil rights.



1964: Supreme Knight John W. McDevitt takes office. His first priority is to amend the Order's admission policies to counter charges of racial discrimination.

1965: In April 1965, the Order co-sponsors with the Archdiocese of Hartford a Conference on Human Rights at Yale University in New Haven. More than 2,000 people attend.

1966: Supreme Knight McDevitt visits the Vatican Transmitting Center for the blessing of a new shortwave radio transmitter donated by the Knights. Pope Paul VI blesses the transmitter.

1969: The present Supreme Council headquarters is completed. Its four 320-foot towers symbolize the Knights' four principles of charity, unity, fraternity and patriotism.

1969: The Order publishes a booklet on Humanae Vitae, Pope Paul VI's 1968 encyclical affirming the Church's teaching on marriage and procreation.

1971: The Order marks the achievement of \$2 billion of insurance in force; today that figure is more than \$113.5 billion.



1975: The Order agrees to fund "uplink" transmissions for major worldwide satellite telecasts from the Vatican; the program continues to this day with audiences estimated in the billions for Midnight Mass from St. Peter's Basilica.

1977: Supreme Knight Virgil C. Dechant begins his administration with a visit to the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, where he places the Knights of Columbus under the Virgin Mary's protection.

1978: Beginning this year, each new First Degree Knight receives a rosary blessed by the supreme chaplain, a practice that continues to this day.

1978: Pope John Paul I receives Supreme Knight Dechant and other K of C representatives in the pontiff's first private audience after his election.
