Lord Jesus, who continues to see hands armed with weapons under the shadow of the cross, forgive us, Lord.


Forgive us if, not content with the nails with which we pierced your hand, we continue to drink from the blood of the dead torn apart by weapons.

LENTEN GUIDELINES FOR ALL CATHOLICS Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by everyone 18 years and older, who has not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, enough to maintain strength, may be taken, according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but consuming liquids, including milk and juices, is allowed. Abstinence is observed by everyone 14 years of age or older. On days of abstinence, no meat is allowed. Note that when health or the ability to work is affected, the law does not apply. Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays during Lent, and Good Friday are days of abstinence. If a person is unable to observe the above regulations due to ill health or other serious reasons, other suitable forms of self-denial are encouraged.

DON'T FORGET

CHARLESTON CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL-SPAGHETTI DINNER FOR HOPE THIS SUNDAY Charleston Catholic's HOPE Project will host a Spaghetti Dinner Fundraiser, 5:30-7:30, on Sunday, Feb. 26th in the CCHS Commons. Tickets are \$10 a plate. Children, age 5 and under, eat for free. Tickets can be purchased ahead of time at the school office or at the door on Feb. 26th. All of the proceeds from the dinner will go toward the costs for the week-long project in June. HOPE participants commit to raise \$25,000 so that the Cabwaylingo Appalachian Mission can build a house for a family in need. Students and adult volunteers spend the week repairing homes and helping with the new construction. HOPE has the dual purpose of improving the quality of housing for low income folks in need and instilling the habit of service in students with a commitment to living the works of mercy.

From our music director...

A Joyful Psalm #79: Psalm 51

God forgives *all sins*. And there is a means to this forgiveness. The readings this weekend get to the core of our spiritual life as Catholics. In the First Reading, we read about God creating man on the sixth day of creation. God breathes life into Adam (Gen. 2:7). Adam and Eve go on to commit the first sin, and the entire human race now is subject to this Original Sin.

King David addresses sin poignantly within Psalm 51. He lists three categories of sin: (1) Iniquities; (2) Transgressions; (3) Sin. The number three in Hebrew means "total" or "all." David is stressing that God forgives all sins.

Fast-forward to the Gospel of John 20:21, and we see Jesus establishing the Sacrament of Confession: "He breathed on them and said, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven." The last time God breathed on anyone was in the Garden of Eden when he breathed life into Adam. Jesus now breathes on the Apostles as he charges them to go forth and forgive sins.

The Lord wants to forgive all our sins. May we be so courageous to ask for His loving mercy during this Lenten season.

Fr. Sadie's "Cogitationes"

Antisemitic incidents reached a historic high in 2021, according to the Anti-Defamation League, and a series of high-profile incidents at the close of 2022 suggest that this unfortunate trend has likely continued.

Cardinal Wilton Gregory, the Archbishop of Washington, and the Catholic co-chair of the National Council of Synagogues-US Conference of Catholic Bishops Consultation. Catholic political figures "should be outraged and embarrassed and concerned (about antisemitism) in their position as leaders, and as Catholics in the public arena."

The U.S.C.C.B.'s statement condemning antisemitism in November: "The rising trend of antisemitism incidents has become even more painful in light of the Church's relationship to the Jewish tradition and our connections to the Jewish people in dialogue and friendship"... "In unequivocal terms, we condemn any and all violence directed at the Jewish people, whether motivated by religious, racial, or political grievances"... "We furthermore denounce any rhetoric which seeks to demonize or dehumanize the Jewish people or Judaism as a religious tradition."

Eucharistic Prayer I


The first Eucharistic Prayer is lengthy and ponderous. Its repetitive structure so differs from the other prayers that it can be hard to follow. Yet throughout our history as a Church, the Roman Rite has used no other Eucharistic Prayer more frequently. Inspired by St. Ambrose in the fourth century, it became the only Eucharistic Prayer permissible in the Roman liturgy until the Second Vatican Council. Having no Preface of its own, it accepted one chosen for the feast, season, or occasion. The rest of the prayer remained unchanged since about the seventh century and assumed the title "canon" because it was the only one. Now because we have so many Eucharistic Prayers, it is less accurate to call any of them a "canon."

The prayer balances across the account of the Last Supper. We pray for the living in the first half, for the dead in the second. We ask intercession from some saints in the first half and from others in the second. The prayer never included an explicit appeal to the Holy Spirit, which caused some controversy among the Eastern Churches noted for their devotion to the third person of the Trinity. Consequently, every single Eucharistic Prayer approved since Vatican II includes an explicit "epiclesis"—a request for the Holy Spirit to change the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ.

Although fixed in form, Prayer I offers internal options. The Prefaces change. The lists of the saints may be abbreviated. Many subsections conclude with an optional formula: "Through Christ our Lord. Amen." The first Eucharistic Prayer also permits a special acknowledgment of some feasts such as Christmas, Holy Thursday and Easter. Before Vatican II, Pope John XXIII authorized one last change to the Roman Canon: he included St. Joseph among the list of saints. A few years after the council, the Memorial Acclamation was added as well. Eucharistic Prayer I is admittedly hard to follow, but its endurance gives testimony to the timelessness of the Catholic faith.

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT



The Lord Alone

Faithful God, from the very beginning you have called your people to worship you with single-minded focus. You are the one true God, source of all goodness and mercy. Grant us the strength to resist earthly temptations, the will to turn from distractions, and the desire to orient our lives

toward loving you first. We ask for your patience as we seek to grow in holiness this Lent through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Sunday, February 26, 2023 God First

Today's readings: Genesis 2:7-9; 3:1-7; Psalm 51:3-4, 5-6, 12-13, 17; Romans 5:12-19 or 5:12, 17-19; Matthew 4:1-11. Jesus gets the last word when the devil tries to lure him with earthly temptations. He quotes the Shema from Deuteronomy, chapter 6: "Hear O Israel! The LORD is our God, the LORD alone! Therefore, you shall love the LORD, your God, with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength" (6:4-5). This most fundamental expression of faith orients our spiritual focus for the season of Lent. It is a clear invitation from the Scriptures to turn our hearts toward God.

A simple pie chart of how the majority of our time is spent during any week will reveal the priorities around which our lives are ordered and what or whom we worship. Do we seek the accumulation of possessions or power; do we worship celebrities or ideologies; do we serve egocentric goals or addictions? Lent offers us the opportunity for *metanoia*, the profound transformation of mind and heart. Now is the time to take a self-inventory and make deliberate choices that place God first in our heart and mind. These choices are expressed in the activities and gestures of our daily living. Sketch out your pie chart and take an honest look at it. Then write a love letter back to God, telling him your plan for how you intend to place God at the center of your life this Lent.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, February 27 Mercy Works

How shall we grow in holiness this Lent? We don't have to guess. Today's Scriptures lay out the blueprint. The instructions from Leviticus give clear direction for avoiding sin. Equally important, the Gospel passage from Matthew calls us to active engagement in the corporal works of mercy. We have six weeks before Easter. Pick one work of mercy to focus on each week of Lent; resolve to try the works of mercy you find most challenging first. Today's readings: Leviticus 19:1–2, 11–18; Psalm 19:8, 9, 10, 15; Matthew 25:31–46.

Tuesday, February 28 Our Father

Each Lent we are invited to deepen our prayer life. In today's Gospel, Jesus teaches us exactly how to do just that through giving us the words of the Lord's Prayer. How can we magnify our prayer life? A possible start could be by praying the Lord's Prayer more intentionally. Write or type the prayer line by line on a sheet of white paper. Cut into strips. Reflect on each line of the prayer. Make the practice part of your daily prayer routine this Lent. Today's readings: Isaiah 55:10–11; Psalm 34:4–5, 6–7, 16–17, 18–19; Matthew 6:7–15.

Wednesday, March 1 Create in Me A Clean Heart

Responsorial Psalm 51 is prayed repeatedly through the season of Lent because it expresses the humble stance we are called to assume: "A heart contrite and humbled, O God, you will not spurn." Catholics celebrate the sacrament of reconciliation each Lent as an essential step of spiritual preparation for Easter. Seek reconciliation early in Lent as a way to turn over the soil of your heart and make room for the new seeds of faith to grow in the coming weeks. Today's readings: Jonah 3:1–10; Psalm 51:3–4, 12–13, 18–19; Luke 11:29–32.

Thursday, March 2 Ask, Seek, Knock

Today's Scriptures are deeply reassuring. The psalmist glorifies God, "on the day I asked for help, you answered me." Jesus promises, "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." What do you need to ask God for today? Write a letter to God and lay out all the burdens you carry. Ask for what you need with confidence in God's faithfulness. Today's readings: Esther C:12, 14–16, 23–25; Psalm 138:1–2ab, 2cde–3, 7c–8; Matthew 7:7–12.

Friday, March 3 Time to Heal

Jesus reminds the disciples, and us, of how broken relationships harm the soul. Lent is the time for reconciliation with God and with the people in our lives. Do you have an estranged relationship? What steps can you take toward healing? For starters, name a relationship that seems to hold you in bondage. Ask God to guide you in seeking freedom from anger, judgment, frustration, and resentment. Attend to the ways God provides opportunities to take repairing steps in the coming days. Today's readings: Ezekiel 18:21–28; Psalm 130:1–2, 3–4, 5–7a, 7bc–8; Matthew 5:20–26.

Saturday, March 4 Lifting Up a Relationship

The call to pay attention to difficult relationships in our lives continues in today's Scripture readings. Jesus tells us the first steps toward healing: pray for that person daily as part of your Lenten sacrifice. This can be challenging. Praying for those who cause us distress requires humility. Heed the advice of our Lord and take note of the movement of your heart as you do so in the coming weeks. *Today's readings: Deuteronomy* 26:16–19; *Psalm* 119:1–2, 4–5, 7–8; *Matthew* 5:43–48.

I write today to inform you of some updates regarding the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston's requirements for maintaining a Safe Environment for children and vulnerable adults. The worldwide sex abuse crisis in the Catholic church continues to impact our methods for keeping children and vulnerable adults safe here in the United States. In our diocese, we continue to make every effort to create and maintain a culture of safety. In October of 2022, our Independent Review Board, at my request and as a matter of best practice, initiated a policy review relative to Safe Environment, and I would like to inform you of the updates that resulted.

First, some history: As you know, since 2002, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has adhered to the *Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People*, a document which mandates Safe Environment requirements and mechanisms to hold U.S. dioceses accountable in these efforts. Here, and in dioceses across the U.S., members of the clergy are required to undergo background checks, sex abuse awareness training, receipt and review of our Diocese's Sex Abuse Policy, and acknowledgements related to mandated reporting and our Code of Conduct. In addition, the diocese requires fingerprinting and completion of monthly training bulletins for clergy and those who are employed in Catholic schools. Every quarter, we convene an Independent Review Board which ensures that any matters are reported in a proper and timely fashion. These volunteers also advise the Diocese on matters of concern, credibility, and courses of action on sex-abuse related matters.

As a result of the recent policy review, and in addition to the requirements mentioned above, we have strengthened our Safe Environment efforts by:

- Expanding the scope of the diocese's Independent Review Board: The Independent Review Board will always prioritize clergy-related sex abuse of minor claims, in accordance with the *Charter*. However, the board's scope now also includes boundary violations and other adult behavioral issues and concerns relative to clergy as well as employees and volunteers. Diocesan review boards across the U.S. are implementing best practices to address other areas of concern and impropriety, in addition to those central to the clergy sex abuse of minors issues. The Review Board in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston has been moving in this direction for the past several years and formalized this best practice through policy changes at its January 2023 meeting.

 Updating language to include guidelines and best practices for use of social media, digital and internet platforms, and electronic communications; expanded and modern reporting mechanisms; and clarification regarding the inappropriateness of all types of pomography.

 Including a comprehensive list of employee and volunteer roles at the parish and school level to which the Safe Environment process applies in an effort to assist our clergy and staff as they manage the administration of locations and programs.

These updates were formalized and took effect on January 11, 2023, at the Independent Review Board's first quarterly meeting of the year.

In our Diocese, we continue to encourage reporting to civil authorities first and foremost if a crime has been alleged. We also continue to promote the use of EthicsPoint, a mechanism for anonymous reporting of various concerns that are not limited to sex abuse. We also encourage reporting to the national Catholic Bishop Abuse Reporting website.

Regarding sex abuse-related claims, the Diocese does not request or require nondisclosure agreements as part of civil settlements. However, the Diocese does respect confidentiality when requested by victims. Funds to settle claims are paid from investment income. They are not paid using any funds donated through parishes, schools, or fundraising appeals.

We also have resources to help any priest, employee, or volunteer navigate disclosures, sex abuse-related issues, or any other issues related to inappropriate conduct should they receive one throughout the course of their ministry, work, or service here.

As a diocese, we continue to focus on prevention and healing and offer support to all who assist in carrying out this important and necessary work.


