LENTEN GUIDELINES FOR ALL CATHOLICS-Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by everyone 18 years and older, who has not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, enough to maintain strength, may be taken, according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but consuming liquids, including milk and juices, is allowed. Abstinence is observed by everyone 14 years of age or older. On days of abstinence, no meat is allowed. Note that when health or the ability to work is affected, the law does not apply. Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays during Lent, and Good Friday are days of abstinence. If a person is unable to observe the above regulations due to ill health or other serious reasons, other suitable forms of self-denial are encouraged.



Fr. Sadie's "Cogitationes"

A writer to the Gazette Mail (2-24-23) states, "The Christian Community has failed" in its response to the earthquakes in Syria and Turkey and asks if that is because "85% to nearly 100% of Syrian and Turkish people are Muslims." I cannot speak for other "faith communities," but I am acquainted with and proud of the Catholic Church's response.

Shortly after the earthquakes, WV Bishop Brennan directed all WV Catholics to join all U.S. Catholics to pray for (all) the victims and survivors, "85% to 100% of whom are Muslims. He also directed that all Catholic parishes and missions in WV take up a special collection to help (all) survivors, "85% to 100% of whom are Muslims." We Catholics help others, not because they are Catholic, but because we are Catholic.

Pope Francis sent two Archbishops to the area with Vatican aid and personally met the Turkish ambassador to discuss Turkey's needs.

The apostolic nuncio to Syria brought aid to the worst-affected areas and has met with Catholic and Orthodox Bishops, Muslim leaders and members of charitable organizations and religious orders supporting relief efforts. In Aleppo, Syria, all nine Christian Churches, Catholic and Orthodox, formerly called rites, have come to the aid of the stricken population.

Among other groups offering aid are (CRS) Catholic Relief Services, (CNEWA) Catholic Near East Welfare Association, (ACN) Aid to the Church in need, Caritas Syria, Caritas Turkey, male and female religious orders such as Franciscans, Marists, Salesians, Jesuits, Sisters of Charity, the Catholic Melkite Patriarch, and the Syrian, Greek, and Antiochian Orthodox Patriarchs. Other relief groups I know about are (MECC) Middle East Council of Churches, (SAMS) Syrian American Medical Society, (my local Syrian-American Muslim Doctor returned to Syria to help). Catholic and Orthodox Churches and Muslim mosques, capable of doing so, have remained open to house and feed (all) survivors and have worked together to distribute humanitarian aid. The Chaldean Catholic Bishop of Aleppo visited the Imam at a local mosque to offer blankets to the displaced Muslim families. A Catholic Priest in Aleppo has found a sign of hope in this cooperation among faith communities. "The earthquake has united our efforts, erased our differences, mobilized all our capabilities..."

From our music director...

A Joyful Psalm #81: Psalm 95

Have you ever had to build furniture from the store? When I get home, I like to start building immediately, so as to not waste the entire day with the hundreds of steps required to complete a chest of drawers. However, if I don't take my time and follow the instructions, I could have to back-track to correct my errors. And then my wife will say, "Did you follow the instructions?!"

The readings this weekend remind us to *follow the instructions*. In the First Reading, the Israelites are wandering through the desert and they begin to grow quite thirsty: "Why did you ever make us leave Egypt? Was it just to have us die here of thirst with our children and our livestock?" (Ex.17:3) God gives Moses *specific instructions*: "Go over there in front of the people...Strike the rock, and the water will flow from it for the people to drink." (Ex.17:3-7) But Moses can't simply *follow the instructions*. Later in the Book of Numbers, we see Moses frustrated with the people. He strikes the rock *twice* in anger. Consequently, God never allows Moses to enter the promised land. (see Numbers 20:11)

As for ourselves, should we hear God's voice in prayer, we should trust in Him who is the "Rock of our salvation." (Ps.95:2). Psalm 95 reminds us to keep faith in the Lord and to not doubt his mighty works: "Oh, that today you would hear his voice: 'Harden not your hearts as at Meribah, as in the day of Massah in the desert, Where your fathers tempted me; they tested me though they had seen my works.'" (Ps.95:8-9)

Trust in the Lord with all your heart (Prov.3:5). Even if His answer is a difficult one. And for heaven's sake, *follow the instructions*.

Sunday, March 12, 2023 God Sees Our Hearts

Today's readings: Exodus 17:3-7; Psalm 95:1-2, 6-7, 8-9; Romans 5:1-2, 5-8; John 4:5-42. The Third Sunday of Lent marks the midpoint on our journey from Ash Wednesday to Holy Week. Day by day the invitations to turn our hearts toward God and receive his gifts of mercy and love intensify. The midday encounter between Jesus and the woman of Samaria at Jacob's well amplifies the invitation extended on Ash Wednesday to "return to me with your whole heart" (Joel 2:12).

We can imagine Jesus approaching each new encounter seeking to intuit, "What does their heart need from me?" Jesus immediately perceived the deepest needs of the woman's heart and pivoted the conversation from physical thirst to spiritual thirst. His willingness to ignore the social norms of the time and speak to her with frank familiarity reminds us that God's invitation to relationship is for everyone, no matter our past, our gender, our ancestry, our place in life.

Jesus reveals his divine purpose to this outcast woman and offers her the hope of eternal life. Our second reading, from the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans, echoes this remarkable promise, "Hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the holy Spirit that has been given to us" (5:5).

Throughout Lent, God summons us unceasingly. The woman at Jacob's well represents every one of us. When God looks deeply into your heart today, what spiritual thirst needs to be quenched?



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, March 13 Look for the Prophets

Prophets are people specially chosen to be messengers of God's Word in their time and place. Our Scriptures tell story after story about the persistence of prophets and resistance to their message. Prophets often surprise us in their simplicity and ordinariness. Take a moment today to look for the prophets God has sent in the here and now. Open your heart to the message they offer. Today's readings: 2 Kings 5:1–15b; Psalm 42:2, 3; 43:3, 4; Luke 4:24–30.

Tuesday, March 14

Today's message cuts right to the heart. Forgiveness is hard. But it is a requirement of discipleship. Jesus calls us to forgive and forgive and forgive again. Take this command to prayer today. Whom do you still need to forgive? It might even be yourself. Write a letter to Jesus specifically naming whom you need to forgive, the reason, and ask for help to take the next step. Today's readings: Deuteronomy 3:25, 34–43; Psalm 25:4–5ab, 6 and 7bc, 8 and 9; Matthew 18:21–35.

Wednesday, March 15 Living Witnesses

Pope Francis reminds us that "all of us are called to offer others an explicit witness to the saving love of the Lord" (The Joy of the Gospel, 121). No matter our occupation or place in life, we are first and foremost teachers of our faith. We teach with our words, but even more through our actions, gestures, and choices. Our ultimate purpose is to allow our life to speak the faith we carry within. This is how we give glory to God. Today's readings: Deuteronomy 4:1, 5-9; Psalm 147:12-13, 15-16, 19-20; Matthew 5:17-19.

Thursday, March 16 Listen to My Voice

The Lord commands, "Listen to my voice" (Jeremiah 7:23). The psalmist echoes, "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts (Psalm 95:7–8). The voice of the Lord that comes to us daily through the season requires our openness. While serious, challenging, and straightforward, our Lord clearly speaks the path of life for us. He tells us how to live, how to love, how to pray, how to give, how to forgive. Do you allow his voice to guide your life? Take these thoughts to prayer. Today's readings: Jeremiah 7:23–28; Psalm 95:1–2, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 11:14–23.

Friday, March 17 St. Patrick

Patrick and his monks ministered to the people of Ireland in the early fifth century. The monks based their spirituality on that of St. Jerome and St. Augustine, who affirmed that no person can walk without a guide. The monks practiced an early form of confessional counseling, inviting people to acknowledge their sins and repair the conduct of their Christian lives. This week marks the midpoint of Lent. How are you doing toward creating a clean heart? There is still plenty of time before Easter to seek the sacrament of reconciliation and make needed adjustments in daily choices. Today's readings: Hosea 14:2–10; Psalm 81:6c–8a, 8bc–9, 10–11ab, 14 and 17; Mark 12:28–34.

Saturday, March 18 Cultivate Humility

Humility is a virtue that exudes from our very being. The virtue is conveyed with our eyes, with our demeanor, and with our spirit, even before words reveal our true selves. A spirit of humility is cultivated through a life of gratitude for the blessings we have received and with sincere awareness of our dependence upon the generous giver of those blessings. There is always room to grow so we call upon the words of the psalmist in our daily prayer and ask for a humble spirit. Today's readings: Hosea 6:1-6; Psalm 51:3-4, 18-19, 20-21ab; Luke 18:9-14.

But the rest of the prayer is verbalized by the priest. Even though the priest alone speaks the words out loud, all in the assembly join their hearts together in prayer with him.

For many centuries, the Roman Church used only one such prayer, which we now call Eucharistic Prayer I. Immediately after the Second Vatican Council, we added three more prayers to the repertoire. More have followed since. Of those first three new prayers, II and IV were based on texts from the first few centuries after Christ. However, Eucharistic Prayer III was a new composition based on the old forms.

Eucharistic Prayer III has no Preface of its own between the opening dialogue and the Holy. Nearly one hundred different Prefaces may be used to open the prayer. After the Holy is sung, Prayer III starts with the words "You are indeed holy, O Lord, and all you have created rightly gives you praise." The entire opening of the prayer—the Preface, the Holy, and these first lines—all give praise to God.

The rest of the prayer follows a traditional outline. We pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the bread and wine. We remember the mighty deeds of God, especially the events of the Last Supper. We sing the mystery of our faith. We offer our gift to God. We pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit over the assembly. We pray intercessions for the Church's ministers, for the living and the dead. We conclude the prayer with a doxology and Amen.

We often use Eucharistic Prayer III on Sundays and on feasts, especially because the interchangeable Prefaces can identify the significance of the day of celebration.

Dear fellow servants of the Lord,

It has been three years since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and my decision, for the health of the Catholic people, to suspend the public celebration of Mass in this Diocese. When we resumed public Masses in late May 2020, it was with various safety protocols in place, one of which was not to offer the Sacred Cup to the faithful. That meant that, in most circumstances, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion were not needed at Mass.

With a notable improvement in the COVID scenario and after consultation with my staff and hearing from many of the faithful, I have decided to restore the distribution of the Sacred Cup at Mass, beginning Holy Thursday, April 6, 2023, the memorial of the Lord's institution of the Eucharist. This also allows time to plan for an orderly implementation of the revival of the ministry of Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion.

In accordance with canon law and continuing the tradition of this Diocese, I as your Bishop have the authority to mandate Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion for a period of three years at their respective locations. Because three years have now passed since this special ministry was in general use, I am taking this opportunity to renew the process of all EMHCs' training and certification.

Therefore, I ask all pastors and administrators, between now and April 6, to organize and conduct training sessions for all Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. This is also an opportunity to recruit new persons for this valuable ministry. Following the training sessions, pastors and administrators must submit an approved list of those who attended the training, including a sentence or two indicating why this person has been nominated for the ministry. The list should be sent to Mrs. Karen Muenze, secretary of the Office of Worship and Sacraments, at kmuenze@dwc.org. She will update the current diocesan database for EMHCs and issue each of them a new certificate with an expiration date three years hence.

As you conduct the training sessions (one should be enough but schedule more, if needed), please include the following points:

1. The Catholic Theology of the Eucharist

The Sacrament is truly Christ's Body and Blood, his Real Presence, the Lord in Person in a mysterious yet genuine way. It is the only Sacrament in which the sign becomes what it signifies: Jesus Christ himself. The Eucharist is both a sign of our unity in faith and love and a means of building it up. The Lord comes to us to strengthen us for our mission to proclaim his Gospel and to work for justice, peace and charity in our world.

2. Proper Vocabulary

While Christ comes under the continuing appearances of bread and wine, both clergy and laity who serve as EMHCs should remember that, at the moment in which they and the faithful receive Holy Communion, it is the Lord they receive, not bread and wine. That is why the minister of the Sacrament says to the recipient, "The Body of Christ" and "The Blood of Christ." A too casual use of the words "bread" and "wine" tends to diminish the reality of the Eucharist. Speaking of the Body of Christ and the Blood of Christ reminds us of the reality of what we receive and what we distribute.

3. Practical Matters:

- a.) Prior to Mass, be aware of how much wine you will need probably less when the distribution of the Precious Blood is first being restored so that there is not too much of the Precious Blood left to consume after Mass.
- b.) All ministers of Holy Communion should sanitize their hands before beginning to offer the Sacrament to the faithful.
- c.) In administering the Sacred Cup, the minister should wipe the lip of the Chalice with the purificator and give the Chalice a quarter-turn after each communicant receives the Precious Blood. All parts of the purificator ought to be used. It is not appropriate that the faithful self-communicate by intinction, for the Sacrament is meant to be *received* from the Lord, with his servant (priest, deacon, EMHC) acting as his agent.
- d.) The priest or deacon should purify the sacred vessels at the altar but it is prudent that someone wash them in the sacristy with hot water and a mild detergent after Mass.






