

Catholic Teaching on In Vitro Fertilization (IVF)

The Alabama Supreme Court's 8-1 decision on February 16, 2024, declaring that an embryo is a human being and is protected under state law from mistreatment, has brought to public scrutiny the procedure called in vitro fertilization (IVF). The media generally has derided the decision, saying that the Court's decision makes embryos equivalent to "people" or "children." Many politicians, both conservative and liberal, have taken a stand in favor of IVF and say it must be protected in law. The Alabama legislature quickly passed a bill giving legal immunity to facilities that perform IVF and to those who seek it. IVF births are about 2% of all children born in the United States.

The underlying problem is infertility. I pray regularly for infertile couples I know. Every once in a while, I hear that the wife is now pregnant and I rejoice. A couple usually seeks advice from a gynecologist/obstetrician. If the OBGYN follows established protocols, a thorough examination of fertility issues for both the man and the woman is conducted, which sometimes leads to remedies that allow the couple to conceive a child naturally. There are reports that at other times a complete fertility examination is not done and the couple is simply referred to a fertility clinic to start IVF or artificial insemination.

The basic principle guiding Catholic reflection on infertility is that measures that assist a couple to conceive a child in their marital act are permissible while measures that replace the marital act are not. Both nature and God intend that the conception of new human beings occur in the intimate relations of a man and woman who should be committed not only to one another (i.e., married) but to the responsible upbringing of their children.

IVF departs from that norm. Its very name, in vitro, means in Latin that the conception occurs "in glass" (a petri dish in most cases), not in the couple's marital act. Ovum and sperm are extracted from the man and woman, often by masturbation, and are manipulated in the laboratory. Multiple embryos are usually created, because some do not survive the freezing before insertion in the mother; others are not used because they are judged to have low reproductive potential; and some of those with high reproductive potential fail to attach to the uterine wall. As laudable as sympathy for an infertile couple may be, there is more than a whiff of "eugenics" in IVF as medical personnel choose which embryos are worthy of life and which are not.

So, what happens to the embryos that are not used? Unless the couple objects, they are discarded. If the couple wants to keep them, they are kept frozen for possible future use. Now, consider again what the media and many politicians have said: "The Alabama Supreme Court called these embryos people!" But the Court got it exactly right. What species are these embryos? Canine (dog)? Feline (cat)? Bovine (cow)? No, they are homo sapiens: they are "humans who know." They may be small and only in the initial stages of development, but they are human beings. Simply throwing them out kills them, a literal example of Pope Francis' sharp criticism of our modern "throw-away culture."

Even though the embryos that died in the Alabama hospital should never have been conceived by IVF, still they were conceived and should be protected. That's why the Alabama Supreme Court ruled that the parents of those embryos could sue for damages owing to the destruction of their children due to the negligence of the IVF clinic.

Every help possible should be given to couples experiencing infertility but the ends do not justify the means. Technology in medicine as in warfare, commerce, and daily actions such as driving a car or using the Internet must be guided by ethical standards or else technology will betray the good which it pretends to serve. IVF looks for a short-term solution but does not recognize the longer-term damage it does by making the embryo an object of medical manipulation rather than a fruit of parental love.

The Catholic Church, relying on the sound conclusions of philosophy, anthropology and moral theology, has not approved in vitro fertilization because it does not assist a couple to achieve a pregnancy through their intimate union but rather replaces it. Our Church has also sponsored research to aid infertile couples. It behooves a couple facing infertility to insist on a thorough examination of the causes of their condition to see if a remedy may be found.

It is the normal desire and expectation of most couples to have children but there is no absolute right to have a child. If a couple's desire cannot be achieved by morally and spiritually appropriate means, then, if they are persons of faith, it behooves them to accept their condition, just as God would want them to do if they conceived and gave birth to a child with serious physical or mental deficiencies. Potential parents are not consumers" buying" children. I have known childless couples who have adopted children, others who have given time and energy working with youth in their parish or community, others who have careers teaching children or serving them in the medical and legal professions. When faced with childlessness, we who believe in a provident God must seek above all to do God's will and trust that this will bring the best outcome: peace of soul and a clear conscience.

Fifth Sunday of Lent

God of all life, who raised Lazarus from the dead, and released the poor from their suffering, you lead us in the land of the living: bless us and give us your Spirit, your Spirit of generosity and holiness, of life and of creative energy. Lift us from our graves of sinfulness and raise us from our dry and wasteful ways. May our sins be left behind and our life in your Spirit bring us joy. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Sunday, March 17, 2024-Spirit Dwelling Within

Today's readings: Ezekiel 37:12–14; Psalm 130:1–2, 3–4, 5–6, 7–8; Romans 8:8–11; John 11:1–45. The Spirit of God gives life. Today's readings emphasize the role of the Spirit in those apparently dead. Ezekiel emphasizes this image vividly: graves will be opened, and we will rise from them. That is only the beginning, though. God will settle us in our land by putting his Spirit within us.

Have you already died, buried in a grave of apathy, disillusionment, or sinfulness? Have you allowed a negative attitude to cut you off from God? If so, you have dug your grave. The first reading reminds us that God's Spirit is in us that we might live; and we are not just to live, but "settle" in the land of the living.

We who have been baptized carry within us the Spirit of Christ, as St. Paul reminds us in the second reading, and therefore have life—Christ's life—dwelling in us. That is a reminder that we are sustained by our baptismal graces throughout our ups and downs, our joys and our failings. We do not need to remain in the graves we have dug. When we are open to the Spirit of God dwelling in us, we can take part in the new life that Christ offers.

Belief in Jesus as the resurrection and the life is at the heart of today's Gospel. In the dialogue between Jesus and Martha, Jesus states, "Whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live." Martha, Mary, and Lazarus had lived the life of the Spirit of God. Jesus' raising Lazarus from the dead, then, is an affirmation that the grave had no power over a life lived in the Spirit.

This Week at Home

Monday, March 18-Traps for Kindness

Even though Jesus was without sin, he did not condemn. How much more should we, with our failings and shortcomings, follow his example and offer a kind word instead of judgment. As we live these final days of Lent, let us practice kindness by complimenting others and refraining from critical words. Today's readings: Daniel 13:1-9, 15-17, 19-30, 33-62; Psalm 23:1-3a, 3b-4, 5, 6; John 8:1 -11.

Tuesday, March 19-Feast of St. Joseph

"It was not through the law that the promise was made to Abraham and his descendants that he would inherit the world, but through the righteousness that comes from faith," we hear in today's reading from Romans. The phrase "righteousness from faith" personifies St. Joseph, who was inclined to quietly divorce the pregnant Mary but followed the angel's instruction and took her into his home. Have you considered looking to St. Joseph as a model of faith? Today's readings: 2 Samuel 7:4–5a, 12–14a, 16; Psalm 89:2–3, 4–5, 27 and 29; Romans 4:13, 16–18, 22; Matthew 1:16, 18–21, 24a or Luke 2:41–51a.

Wednesday, March 20-Becoming Better

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells his listeners that to be his disciples, they are to remain in his Word. Only by remaining in his Word will they know the truth and be set free from sin. Reading and meditating on Scripture is a regular practice of many to come closer to God during Lent. During your prayer time, ponder how you act out your discipleship. Are the people that you encounter aware that you are a Christian by the way you live? Today's readings: Daniel 3:14–20, 91–92, 95; Psalm: Daniel 3:52, 53, 54, 55, 56; John 8:31–42.

Thursday, March 21-Beyond Imagination

Abraham surely never imagined that God would come to him to make a covenant. It is beyond imagination that God would come to make "an everlasting pact." Yet God promised the childless Abraham that he would be "the father of a host of nations." God has a plan for each of us too. In the Gospel, we hear, "Whoever keeps my word will never see death." To keep God's Word is the work of each disciple. For that work, the reward is eternal life. Today's readings: Genesis 17:3–9; Psalm 105:4–5, 6–7, 8–9; John 8:51–59.

Friday, March 22-Do You Believe?

In the first reading, we hear the prophet Jeremiah say, "All those who were my friends are on the watch for any misstep of mine." Jesus, too, knew that people who practiced their religion looked for reasons to arrest or stone him. Reminding them of the Father's good works he had performed, he asked, "For which of these are you trying to stone me?" In the world today, who is being punished for their good works? How do you recognize the work and action of Jesus around you? Today's readings: Jeremiah 20:10–13; Psalm 18:2–3a, 3bc–4, 5–6, 7; John 10:31–42.

Saturday, March 23-All Praise to God

As we stand at the precipice of Holy Week, reflect on a time in your life when you turned away from God. Perhaps you felt persecuted or ashamed of your relationship with God. Many young people face this problem; they hide their faith because it is unpopular, yet our faith in God is not about popularity. How can we be examples of hope to the younger generation? How can you turn a tense moment into an opportunity to share God's love and mercy? Today's readings: Ezekiel 37:21–28; Psalm: Jeremiah 31:10, 11–12abcd, 13; John 11:45–56.

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Chrism Mass


The Chrism Mass comes once a year to your cathedral. If you've never celebrated it, you're missing one of the most solemn and significant liturgies of our Church. During the Mass, your bishop will bless the Oil of Catechumens, the Oil of the Sick, and the Sacred Chrism. We use the first for adult catechumens and infants, the second for anointing the sick, and the Sacred Chrism for Baptism, Confirmation, the ordination of priests and bishops, and the consecration of altars. All three are basically an olive oil; Chrism spices the air with the scent of a perfume, traditionally balsam. For pastoral reasons, another vegetable oil and perfume may be used.

B ishops have blessed oil ever since the early C hurch. T hey baptized catechumens at the E aster Vigil and prepared C hrism fresh for the occasion. While they were consecrating C hrism, they blessed the other oils as well. Rather than overburdening the Vigil with this ritual, bishops blessed these oils at the previous celebration of the E ucharist, Holy T hursday. T his also allowed time to transport vessels of oil from the cathedral to all the churches in the diocese. For more than one thousand years, bishops blessed the oils at the cathedral Holy T hursday liturgy, but in 1955, we added a separate Mass earlier in the day at the cathedral for that purpose, the C hrism Mass. T oday it may be celebrated on a different day shortly before Holy T hursday to give the celebration independence and so that more people like you may attend.

B ecause the bishop is the only minister in the diocese who may consecrate C hrism, this Mass highlights his ministry and our union with him. He will not baptize and confirm everyone in the parishes of the diocese, but he will be symbolically present in the C hrism that the priests and deacons will use. In recent years, this Mass has also acknowledged the ministry of priests. It invites them to renew their commitment of service and to receive the prayers and support of the people. T he C hrism Mass gathers the faithful of the diocese at their mother church with their shepherd to prepare for celebrations of C hrist in all our churches throughout the year.
