

LENTEN GUIDELINES FOR ALL CATHOLICS-Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by everyone 18 years and older, who has not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, enough to maintain strength, may be taken, according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but consuming liquids, including milk and juices, is allowed. Abstinence is observed by everyone 14 years of age or older. On days of abstinence, no meat is allowed. Note that when health or the ability to work is affected, the law does not apply. Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays during Lent, and Good Friday are days of abstinence. If a person is unable to observe the above regulations due to ill health or other serious reasons, other suitable forms of self-denial are encouraged.





## Fr. Sadie's "Cogitationes"

Many of you may not remember or even have experienced the celebration of the Mass in 1957 when I was ordained to the priesthood. For a variety of historical reasons, the Mass was completely in Latin. The Latin readings, the same every year, were read only by the celebrant. There were no Lectors or Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist. Communion was distributed only by the priest, only on the tongue, and only under the form of bread. Most Catholics did not receive Holy Communion frequently and many received only after Confession the previous Saturday. There were no weekday homilies and no Prayer of the Faithful at all. During Mass, worshippers often recited their own devotional prayers such as the rosary or various novenas.

I say all this not in criticism but as background for the promulgation in 1963 by the Vatican II of "Sacrosanctum Concilium", "The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy".

The "full and active participation by all the people is the aim to be considered before all else" (SC 14). People should "take part by means of acclamations, responses, psalmody, antiphons, and songs, as well as by actions, gestures, and bodily attitudes. And at the proper times all should observe a reverent silence" (SC 30).

Sixty years later, here in the United States, Catholics understand and participate in the liturgy far better than in 1963. They sing, make responses, and receive Holy Communion. They are more aware of the scriptures and are aware of more of the scriptures. There is still room for additional implementation, but the Bishops of 1963 should be proud, pleased and praised.

## A Joyful Psalm #82: Psalm 23

Every April, the National Football League hosts the NFL Draft. This is when each NFL team selects college players to join the ranks of their own professional teams. Great attention is paid to the first several players picked, as they are the "best of the best." Little attention is paid to the last player picked. In fact, this player has been deemed, "Mr. Irrelevant." In the 2022 draft, Mr. Irrelevant was QB Brock Purdy from Iowa State. Purdy was selected last by the San Francisco 49'ers. However, after a dramatic season of injuries, San Francisco was forced to send Purdy into the game! Low and behold, the rookie helped send the 49'ers to the NFC Championship Game – one game short of the Superbow!!


Often, God uses "irrelevant" people for His greater glory. In the First Reading this weekend, we read about David: the smallest son of Jesse. God sends Samuel to anoint one of Jesse's sons. All of the boys lineup with excitement. The "irrelevant" David doesn't even show up. He thinks *what's the point?!* Samuel says, "Are these all the sons you have?' Jesse replies, 'There is still the youngest, who is tending the sheep.'" Upon seeing David, Samuel proclaims, "'There—anoint him, for this is the one!' Then Samuel, with the horn of oil in hand, anointed David in the presence of his brothers; and from that day on, the spirit of the LORD rushed upon David." (1 Sam 16:13)

David grows up to become a King, and he beautifully recaps this encounter with Samuel when he writes Psalm 23: "You spread the table before me in the sight of my foes; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows." (Ps. 23:5)

We can all feel "irrelevant" at times in our lives. God is still calling us. He is always shepherding the least of us.

# FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT



## Help Us See

## Sunday, March 19, 2023 Spiritual Sight

Today's readings: I Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a; Psalm 23:1-3a, 3b-4, 6, 6 (1); Ephesians 5:8-14; John 9:1-41. The Fourth Sunday of Lent is known as Laetare (Rejoice) Sunday, a name inspired by the entrance antiphon, "Rejoice, O Jerusalem" (Isaiah 66:10). Today, we momentarily pause from some of the penitential observances of Lent. With joy, our eyes turn toward Easter. This spirit of rejoicing is reflected in our liturgies, which differ from the other Sundays of Lent. Flowers are permitted in the sanctuary. The priest may wear rose-colored vestments, ordinarily worn only on one other day of the liturgical year, the Third Sunday of Advent, or Gaudete Sunday.

The Scripture readings also highlight reasons to rejoice. Jesus proclaims to his disciples, to a blind man on the side of the road, and ultimately to all of us, "I am the light of the world" (John 9:5). Perceiving the deepest needs of the man's heart, Jesus performs a miraculous healing. He restores the man's physical sight to offer him spiritual sight. Through his subsequent encounters with Jesus, the healed man comes to see, believe, and follow him.

Today we are invited to wake up from our blindness. Jesus looks into our hearts and desires to illuminate our intrinsic goodness. He offers us the gift of spiritual sight to see God's essence radiating through all human reality. Shall we follow the blind man's lead and joyfully look at the world and all those we meet with the eyes of faith?



## THIS WEEK AT HOME

## Monday, March 20 St. Joseph

Today we lift up Jesus' earthly father, St. Joseph, who embodied virtue as a father, dedicated worker, compassionate husband, and faithful listener. In fact, our sacred Scriptures recount his choices but never his words. Four times Joseph listens to the angel sent by God to guide his choices, and each time he courageously answers with quiet, trusting obedience. Make time today to emulate his prayer stance by quieting your heart and listening. Today's readings: 2 Samuel 7:4–5a, 12–14a, 16; Psalm 89:2–3, 4–5, 27 and 29; Romans 4:13, 16–18, 22; Matthew 1:16, 18–21, 24a or Luke 2:41–51a.

## Tuesday, March 21 Holistic Healing

The healing power of Jesus is on full display in the Gospel story about the man who had been sick for thirty-eight years. As with most healing stories attributed to Jesus, being "made well" is twofold. Jesus restores both physical health and implores those who are healed to seek spiritual health by avoiding sin. Lent offers us the path to wholeness. Healing comes in a variety of forms. Where do you need Jesus' healing touch today? Today's readings: Ezekiel 47:1–9, 12; Psalm 46:2–3, 5–6, 8–9; John 5:1–16.

#### Wednesday, March 22 The Lord is Near

The responsorial psalm today gets right to the hopeful theme of Lent: God desires to be close to us. The descriptions of the Lord as kind, merciful, slow to anger, gracious, kind, compassionate, faithful, attentive, just, and holy lead to the acclamation that "the LORD is near to all who call upon him" (Psalm 145:18). Place Psalm 145 on your bathroom mirror or over your kitchen sink where you will be reminded throughout each day of God's enduring desire to be in relationship with us. Today's readings: Isaiah 49:8–15; Psalm 145:8–9, 13cd–14, 17–18; John 5:17–30.

## Thursday, March 23 Sent by God

Jesus makes a bold claim to the Jewish community: "the Father has sent me." As he says this, Jesus implores them to heed his voice and trace his living presence to the promises made to Moses. They respond with blind resistance. We have the gift of a much longer view on this interchange between Jesus and the community. Do we respond with faith or skepticism? Today's readings: Exodus 32:7–14; Psalm 106:19–20, 21–22, 23; John 5:31–47.

## Friday, March 24 Close to the Brokenhearted

Our responsorial psalm tenderly proclaims the promise that the Lord is "close to the brokenhearted" (Psalm 34:19). Part of the human condition is the experience of loss, disappointment, rejection, grief, and depression. Our faith offers us confident consolation that the Lord saves "those who are crushed in spirit" (34:19). Remember that we are never alone in our despair; the Lord never forgets us but especially leans in to be close when we are low. Today's readings: Wisdom 2:1a, 12–22; Psalm 34:17–18, 19–20, 21 and 23; John 7:1–2, 10, 25–30.


## Saturday, March 25 Annunciation of the Lord

The word annunciation means "announcement." In our faith story, the angel Gabriel's announcement to Mary changes the course of history. Lent reminds us that God is announcing good news to us in a variety of forms and through the most unexpected messengers. Attend to the angels in our midst, sent by God to inspire, encourage, challenge, and affirm us. The week began with Laetare (Rejoice) Sunday. Today's feast bookends our week of rejoicing. What good news is God offering us today? Today's readings: Isaiah 7:10–14; 8:10; Psalm 40:7–8a, 8b–9, 10, 11; Hebrews 10:4–10; Luke 1:26–38.



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#### **Prayer to Saint Joseph**

Sacred Heart Church

Gathering Space

To you, O blessed Joseph, do we come in our tribulation, and having implored the help of your most holy Spouse, we confidently invoke your patronage also.

Through that charity which bound you to the Immaculate Virgin Mother of God and through the paternal love with which you embraced the Child Jesus, we humbly beg you graciously to regard the inheritance which Jesus Christ has purchased by his Blood, and with your power and strength to aid us in our necessities. O most watchful guardian of the Holy Family, defend the chosen children of Jesus Christ; O most loving father, ward off from us every contagion of error and corrupting influence; O our most mighty protector, be kind to us and from heaven assist us in our struggle with the power of darkness.

As once you rescued the Child Jesus from deadly peril, so now protect God's Holy Church from the snares of the enemy and from all adversity; shield, too, each one of us by your constant protection, so that, supported by your example and your aid, we may be able to live piously, to die in holiness, and to obtain eternal happiness in heaven.

#### **Eucharistic Prayer IV**

Doing nothing. We yearn for that kind of leisure. But doing nothing can also be one of the hardest jobs we face. Take Mass, for example. The parts of the Mass where we do nothing permit us to be distracted by anxieties over kids, the hair color of a choir member, plot developments in tomorrow's soaps, or the possibility of a pennant race.

Perhaps the chief zoning out period is the Eucharistic Prayer, that long solo prayer that the presider recites in all-too-familiar tones, which incongruously is the most important prayer in the history of the planet.

When kids object that Mass is boring, they know they've got you on this one. Even chess Masters find it challenging to concentrate during a Eucharistic Prayer.

Understanding the parts of the prayer may help us to pray it better. Of the ten Eucharistic Prayers approved for use in the United States, one of the most beautiful is prayer IV.

The prayer is structured as most Eucharistic Prayers. An opening dialogue between priest and people leads into a Preface and concludes with the "Holy." A prayer for the Holy Spirit to bless the bread and wine (epiclesis) follows this. Then a recounting of the work of Christ precedes the story of the Last Supper. The second half includes an anamnesis, or remembrance, of Christ's activity; the actual offering of the sacrifice; a second prayer for the Holy Spirit (epiclesis), this time to come not over the gifts, but over the people; and the intercessions, or prayers for the members of the Church and the world.

What distinguishes prayer IV is the long exposition that follows the "Holy." It tells of humanity's place in creation, our need for redemption, and the mission of the Son and Spirit.

This prayer also carries its own Preface, which praises and describes the mystery of God. You usually hear prayer IV more during Ordinary Time. Seasons like Lent and Easter carry their own Prefaces, as do most feasts. These work with other Eucharistic Prayers but not with prayer IV.

This prayer loosely adapts one by St. Basil, prayed by our church in the fourth century and still in use in some of the Eastern Rites. When we hear the story of salvation history, we remember also our own history as a church and recognize Christ, whose eternal presence rescues us from all that could keep us from him—including the boredom of doing nothing.

Dear fellow servants of the Lord,

It has been three years since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and my decision, for the health of the Catholic people, to suspend the public celebration of Mass in this Diocese. When we resumed public Masses in late May 2020, it was with various safety protocols in place, one of which was not to offer the Sacred Cup to the faithful. That meant that, in most circumstances, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion were not needed at Mass.

With a notable improvement in the COVID scenario and after consultation with my staff and hearing from many of the faithful, I have decided to restore the distribution of the Sacred Cup at Mass, beginning Holy Thursday, April 6, 2023, the memorial of the Lord's institution of the Eucharist. This also allows time to plan for an orderly implementation of the revival of the ministry of Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion.

In accordance with canon law and continuing the tradition of this Diocese, I as your Bishop have the authority to mandate Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion for a period of three years at their respective locations. Because three years have now passed since this special ministry was in general use, I am taking this opportunity to renew the process of all EMHCs' training and certification.

Therefore, I ask all pastors and administrators, between now and April 6, to organize and conduct training sessions for all Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. This is also an opportunity to recruit new persons for this valuable ministry. Following the training sessions, pastors and administrators must submit an approved list of those who attended the training, including a sentence or two indicating why this person has been nominated for the ministry. The list should be sent to Mrs. Karen Muenze, secretary of the Office of Worship and Sacraments, at kmuenze@dwc.org. She will update the current diocesan database for EMHCs and issue each of them a new certificate with an expiration date three years hence.

As you conduct the training sessions (one should be enough but schedule more, if needed), please include the following points:

#### **1. The Catholic Theology of the Eucharist**

The Sacrament is truly Christ's Body and Blood, his Real Presence, the Lord in Person in a mysterious yet genuine way. It is the only Sacrament in which the sign becomes what it signifies: Jesus Christ himself. The Eucharist is both a sign of our unity in faith and love and a means of building it up. The Lord comes to us to strengthen us for our mission to proclaim his Gospel and to work for justice, peace and charity in our world.

#### 2. Proper Vocabulary

While Christ comes under the continuing appearances of bread and wine, both clergy and laity who serve as EMHCs should remember that, at the moment in which they and the faithful receive Holy Communion, it is the Lord they receive, not bread and wine. That is why the minister of the Sacrament says to the recipient, "The Body of Christ" and "The Blood of Christ." A too casual use of the words "bread" and "wine" tends to diminish the reality of the Eucharist. Speaking of the Body of Christ and the Blood of Christ reminds us of the reality of what we receive and what we distribute.

#### **3. Practical Matters:**

- a.) Prior to Mass, be aware of how much wine you will need probably less when the distribution of the Precious Blood is first being restored so that there is not too much of the Precious Blood left to consume after Mass.
- b.) All ministers of Holy Communion should sanitize their hands before beginning to offer the Sacrament to the faithful.
- c.) In administering the Sacred Cup, the minister should wipe the lip of the Chalice with the purificator and give the Chalice a quarter-turn after each communicant receives the Precious Blood. All parts of the purificator ought to be used. It is not appropriate that the faithful self-communicate by intinction, for the Sacrament is meant to be *received* from the Lord, with his servant (priest, deacon, EMHC) acting as his agent.
- d.) The priest or deacon should purify the sacred vessels at the altar but it is prudent that someone wash them in the sacristy with hot water and a mild detergent after Mass.

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


