

Fr. Sadie's "Cogitationes" 304-546-4330 CHRISTIANS CELEBRATING EASTER/PASCHA TOGETHER

I am now 92 years old. I have told the Lord many times, "I'm ready, Lord, any time You decide." "Lord, I have now changed my mind. I want to live until Easter 2025, but Thy will be done."

Division over the date of Easter is as old as Christianity. As early as the first century A.D., St. Paul celebrated not the day of Christ's Resurrection, but the day of His death on Passover. (I Cor. 5:7; HEB. 11:28) After the death of the Apostles, many Christians began celebrating "Resurrection Sunday."

In 325 A.D., the controversy had grown so intense, the Bishops of the Christian Church, gathered at the First Ecumenical Council in Nicaea, decreed that Easter be celebrated on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the spring equinox. The council was willing to use contemporary science to calculate the date of Easter/Pascha.

For centuries, Christians did not calculate the equinox astronomically. Then, in 1582, the Catholic Church, long after the Great Schism dividing the Catholic and Orthodox Churches, following the new Gregorian Calendar, began celebrating Easter on a different day than the Orthodox Church which continued to use the Julian calendar established by Julius Caesar in 46 BC.

Recently, the Orthodox Archbishop of Telmessos, the representative of Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew 1 of Constantinople to the World Council of Churches, stated that, by consulting astronomical experts, Catholic and Orthodox Churches should be able, before 2025, the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, to determine the spring equinox from the meridian of Jerusalem, (Longitude 35° 13° 47.1), the place of Christ's Death and Resurrection.

Presently, Catholics and Orthodox celebrate Easter on different days. Interfaith families observe two different Lenten cycles and two different Easter dates. Many non-Christians, scandalized by the division, are impeded from hearing the Good News of Christ's Resurrection. With the growth of secularism, tyranny, hunger and war, there is a great need for a united voice proclaiming "Christ is Alive. Alleluia!"

Echoing the call for Christian Unity, for celebrating Easter/Pascha together, are representatives of the Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople, of the Catholic Church, and of many Christian communities, including the North American Orthodox-Catholic Theological Consultation, Inter-Orthodox Theological Consultation (1971), Pan-Orthodox Conference in Clambesy (1977), Orthodox Theological Society of America (1992), Aleppo Consultation (1997), Lambeth (Anglican) Conference, Lutheran World Federation, Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity (shortly after 1997), United States Orthodox-Lutheran Dialogue (2000), Orthodox Church of Finland (2001), International Seminar at the Ukrainian Catholic University in Lviv (2009), National Council of Churches in the USA (2010), Melkite Patriarch Gregorios III (2010), Pope Tawadros of the Coptic Orthodox Church, Msgr. P. Edward Sadie, PA of Charleston, WV., U.S.A. and others.

I did my pastoral ministry in different parishes as co-pastor as well as parish pastor and educational institutions in our diocese.

I am happy to be here in West Virginia and work in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, moreover I feel blessed to work in Our Basilica of the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart.

Easter

On Easter Sunday, we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus from the dead. On this day, the disciples saw the empty tomb, and the Risen Christ began to appear to them. Easter celebrates our belief in life after death. It ranks first among the feasts of the church.

The Easter Sunday Mass differs a bit from others. The new Paschal candle is lighted and stands near the ambo. Having omitted the Glory to God throughout the season of Lent, we sing it again. The Easter sequence is said or sung after the Second Reading. During Lent, we sang a different acclamation before the Gospel, but now we again sing "Alleluia." In the United States, the Creed may be replaced with the Renewal of Baptismal Promises and the sprinkling of holy water on this day.

There are small changes to the Eucharistic Prayer. If you are alert, you will hear during the Preface that Christ became our paschal sacrifice "on this day." If the priest is using Eucharistic Prayer I, he announces that this is the day of the Resurrection of the Lord and that the community prays especially for those newly baptized at the Easter Vigil.

At the end of the Mass, the deacon or priest adds two "alleluias" to the words of dismissal, and you respond, "Thanks be to God, alleluia, alleluia."

Attendance is strong on Easter, as all those who profess faith in Christ join together in a single celebration. Many worshipers like to dress up for the occasion. The main Easter liturgy is the Easter Vigil on Saturday night, and all Catholics should make every effort to participate in it. But Easter Sunday remains a popular choice for affirming one's faith in the Risen Christ.



Sunday, April 9, 2023 Alleluia!

Today's readings: Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23; Colossians 3:1-4 or 1 Corinthians 5:6b-8; Sequence Victimae paschali laudes; John 20:1-9 or Matthew 28:1-10 or, at an afternoon or evening Mass, Luke 24:13-35. Celebrating Easter is like watching the sunrise in the most beautiful place ever visited. All along our journey through Lent our eyes have been tuned for directional arrows in the Scriptures pointing our steps toward God, who summons us unceasingly.

At Easter we open our hearts fully as the Son rises gloriously and his rays fill us with joy. Together with the community of faith, we renew our baptismal vows. Like a long-married couple renewing their marriage vows, we baptized Christians renew our commitment to Jesus Christ and the Church. We welcome sprinkles of blessed baptismal water as a symbol of our bond in faith. It is a joyous response to God's invitation to return to him with ready hearts. The resurrection is celebrated with our jubilant renewal of faith as the Gloria and Alleluia are sung and trumpets and bells resound. Our sanctuaries and homes are filled with fragrant flowers and our tables hold choice foods to share with those we love. The Son is alive and with us always! Alleluia!



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, April 10 Do Not Be Afraid

In Matthew's resurrection account, the first appearance of the risen Lord is to Mary Magdalene and "the other Mary." The encounter is utterly unexpected. The women were looking for the disciples. They could not imagine seeing Jesus. The first words Jesus speaks are "Peace" and "Do not be afraid." With their fear dispelled, the women embrace their call to be the first witnesses of the risen Christ. Today's readings: Acts 2:14, 22–33; Psalm 16:1–2a and 5, 7–8, 9–10, 11; Matthew 28:8–15.

Tuesday, April 11 Called by Name

John's resurrection account mirrors Matthew's in that the first appearance of the risen Lord is to Mary Magdalene. Consumed with grief and confusion, Mary is unable to recognize Jesus until he calls her by name. At the sound of her name, Mary is forever transformed. With certainty, she announces the good news. On the day of our baptism, and continually throughout our lives, God calls us by name and sends us as living witnesses to the world. Today's readings: Acts 2:36–41; Psalm 33:4–5, 18–19, 20 and 22; John 20:11–18.

Wednesday, April 12

Be Alert

There is so much good news to unpack and celebrate about the resurrection of Jesus that the Church gives us fifty days in the Easter season to do this. Today is one of the many times when we hear about the time Jesus appeared to the disciples on the road to Emmaus. He approaches and walks with them, first listening, then teaching, and ultimately revealing. Jesus does that with each of us, day by day, through the Easter season. Be alert for when he shows up! Today's readings: Acts 3:1–10; Psalm 105:1–2, 3–4, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 24:13–35.

Thursday, April 13

Go Deeper

As Jesus ate and spoke with his disciples in Jerusalem, Luke tells us that "he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures" (Luke 24:45). He reinterpreted sacred Scripture in light of his birth, death, and resurrection, revealing a new layer of meaning about the plan of God. How might we allow our daily reading of the Scriptures through this Easter season to bring us to a deeper understanding of the paschal mystery in our time? Today's readings: Acts 3:11–26; Psalm 8:2ab and 5, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 24:35–48.

Friday, April 14

Fifty Days

Today we hear from John about Jesus' third appearance to his disciples, this time on the beach of the Sea of Tiberias. The disciples have returned to their occupation of fishing. Jesus will be sending them back to the vocation to which he called them as evangelists. Jesus did not give up on his beloved disciples; he does not give up on us. Easter is not over; it has just begun. During these fifty days of Easter, we have time to contemplate how the Lord draws us close, feeds us, and empowers us to be living witnesses of joy. Today's readings: Acts 4:1–12; Psalm 118:1–2 and 4, 22–24, 25–27a; John 21:1–14.

Saturday, April 15

Go Out to the Whole World

The octave (eight days) of Easter concludes with Mark's account of how Jesus appeared first to Mary Magdalene. She immediately went to announce the good news. But, alas, she was met with resistance and disbelief. Witnessing the truth of Jesus Christ in today's culture requires confronting skepticism and rejection. But as Jesus instructed the disciples then, he commands us now to persist and "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). Today's readings: Acts 4:13–21; Psalm 118:1 and 14–15ab, 16–18, 19–21; Mark 16:9–15.








