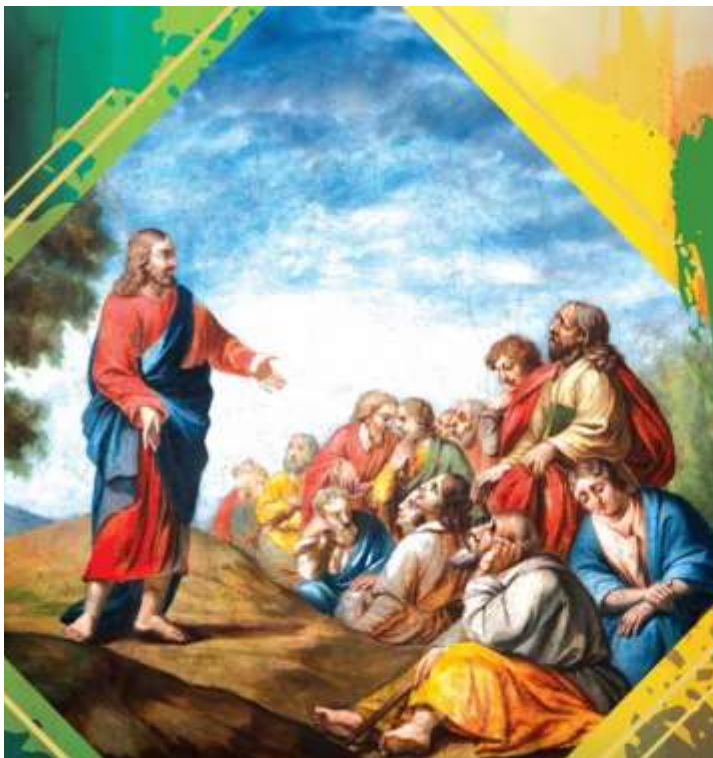

Do you know someone who wants to become Catholic?

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults OCIA, (formerly known as RCIA) is the process established for the universal Church for individuals to become Catholic and receive the sacraments of initiation — Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist. This initiation process also involves a parish community experiencing a renewal in faith as it prepares and welcomes new members into the Church. The OCIA speaks of conversion as a "spiritual journey." Centered on fostering a deep relationship with Jesus and the Church he founded, this journey takes place through distinct stages over a period of time (early September to Easter) suitable to bring about a thorough catechesis, significant experience of the parish community, and commitment to the liturgical and moral life of the Catholic faithful. The OCIA process is a restoration of the ancient catechumenate, arising within the first three centuries following the era of the apostles. It was the early Church's way of Christianizing the pagan Roman Empire. The Second Vatican Council called for the restoration and use of this venerable and powerful method of initiation for the worldwide Church.

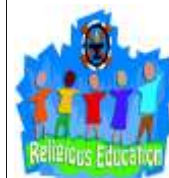
Rosary Study Starts September 3, 2024

Family Fully Alive - August - Hospitality

Scripture speaks frequently about the importance of a family's hospitality because of its life-giving love that nourishes weary souls and heals broken hearts.

Breaking Open the Theme - **Hospitality is necessary for a Christian family as a domestic church. It is part of a Christian's mission** (Heb 13:2, Rom 12:13, Mt 10:42, Lk 10:29-37, Gn 18:1-10). But what is hospitality? Christ teaches us through the parable of the Good Samaritan (Lk 10:29-37) that one dimension of hospitality is "to make a neighbor of a stranger."⁷¹ Hospitality, as the word itself and the parable of the Good Samaritan suggest, helps to heal others, like a hospital.

Meditation - From Pope Francis' Amoris Laetitia

Led by the Spirit, the family circle is not only open to life by generating within itself, but also by going forth and spreading life by caring for others and seeking their happiness. This openness finds particular expression in hospitality, which the word of God eloquently encourages: **"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unaware"** (Heb 13:2).

1. What are some specific ways in which our family practices hospitality within our home? In what ways is hospitality challenging for our family, and in what ways does it help our family grow in grace and happiness?
2. Have we ever thought of hospitality in terms of welcoming the other as Christ? How might this calling of Christian hospitality change our practices of hospitality?
3. What are some ways as a family to grow in hospitality? How might we open our home more to the poor, lonely, brokenhearted and neglected? Is there someone who has a rough family life that could use some time around our family for the support and encouragement that love offers?

Scripture Reading — Psalm 84:9-13 **A praise of God's house**

Family Project - Invite acquaintances from your parish or neighborhood over for a meal, and spend some time socializing afterward. Invite them to join you for family prayer, too.

So Who's the Guy with the Crooked Stole and What is He Doing on the Altar?

I would like to again express my heartfelt gratitude to Father Don, Father Roy and the parishioners of Sacred Heart for your encouragement and support on my journey to the diaconate which culminated in ordination on June 7. Now that the fast-paced busy days following ordination are behind me, Father Don thought it might be a good idea to provide an explanation on the role of a deacon in the life of a parish. I agree. After all, it's been a while since Sacred Heart Parish has had a permanent deacon assigned to it.

You may wonder why I am referred to as a "permanent" deacon. All men who receive holy orders to the priesthood are first ordained deacons. We commonly refer to these men as "transitional" deacons up until the time they receive the fuller degree of holy orders as priests, usually a year or two later. Men who are not on a path to the priesthood are "permanent" deacons. Like me, permanent deacons are usually married, have children and even continue to work in their secular careers.

Deacons, while members of the clergy, have traditionally served as a bridge between bishops and priests and the laity. Their ministry is deeply rooted in the earliest traditions of the Church. The beginning of the diaconate is actually documented in scripture, in Acts 6, where St. Stephen and six others are chosen by the Apostles (the first bishops) to help serve the early Church community distribute its goods to the needy. The Church stopped ordaining permanent deacons around the time of the Council of Trent in the 1500s, but the permanent diaconate was restored in the late 1960s as a result of the Second Vatican Council. Father Don's father, Deacon Henry Higgs, was among the first groups of deacons to serve our diocese following the restoration of the permanent diaconate.

There is a catchy mnemonic that says "a deacon can hatch, match and dispatch." This refers to liturgical and sacramental duties a deacon may perform. He can baptize children (hatch), join couples in the sacrament of holy matrimony (match) and perform rites of Christian burial (dispatch). Of course he cannot say the Mass, so a wedding or funeral presided over by a deacon would be outside of the Mass.

Deacons assist at Mass and sometimes even preach the homily. As part of his duties at Mass, a deacon carries the Book of the Gospels as part of the procession, he proclaims the Gospel and he reads the Universal Prayer (the petitions or prayers of the faithful). These functions reach back to the earliest days of the Church, particularly the reading of the prayers of the faithful, since it is the deacon who comes from the congregation and is therefore familiar with the needs of the community as that bridge referred to earlier. A deacon is also an "ordinary" minister of holy communion.

So if you're a regular lector or extraordinary minister of holy communion, if a deacon is assisting at Mass, then you're "off the hook" for some duties, so to speak. When a deacon is present at Mass, lectors need not process in or read the prayers of the faithful and one less extraordinary minister of holy communion is needed.

While these are the more visible things a deacon does, he also does other things to contribute to parish life. Deacons assist in teaching the faith, especially through faith formation programs and the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (formerly known as RCIA). I have been involved with OCIA here at Sacred Heart for several years and look forward to continuing in this role.

Deacons also provide pastoral care to individuals and families, offering spiritual guidance, counseling, and prayerful support, including visiting the sick, comforting the grieving, and supporting those in need within our community. They also work alongside priests and lay leaders to ensure the smooth operation of parish activities.

In all of these ministries, deacons are to embody the servant-leadership modeled by Jesus Christ, striving to follow His example of humility and compassion. The word "deacon" comes from the Greek word diakonos, which essentially means "servant." I am grateful and excited about serving our parish in this way.

Indulgences

An indulgence is the remission of punishment for a forgiven sin. If your child breaks a window at home and tells you, “I’m sorry,” you may forgive the young offender, but you may still issue a punishment.

In the Catholic Church, the Sacrament of Reconciliation brings forgiveness of sins, which may still carry punishments. Indulgences relax the punishments.

Indulgences first appeared in the 11th century as a way of reducing the penance one was required to perform after confessing a sin. Several hundred years later, they were understood to relax punishments after death—partially or totally. During the Reformation, the abuse of indulgences received sound criticism: people were selling them outright, claiming that you could buy your way into heaven.

In the past, some indulgences came with a certain number of days or years attached. The Church explained that if you gained the indulgence it would speed your progress from purgatory to heaven by that amount of time. Today we no longer apply this metaphor of time.

Although the sale of indulgences has ceased, the practice of performing certain actions to obtain indulgences continues. The Church believes that the good accomplished by Christ and the saints may be shared by the faithful who perform actions of prayer, charity, and self-sacrifice. Believers may even ask God to extend mercy to the faithful departed by remembering these benefits. An appreciation of indulgences is based on the belief that sinful behaviors carry consequences even after death and that God will respond favorably to prayers for mercy.

An indulgence is obtained by performing a devotional action, celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation, sharing the Eucharist, and praying for the intentions of the pope. It celebrates the mercy of God.

Disposing of Religious Articles

When religious articles deteriorate to a point when they can no longer be used effectively, they should be disposed of with dignity. Your parish may burn old palm branches to make ashes for Ash Wednesday. But the proper disposal of other religious articles is not so clear.

The Code of Canon Law says that sacred objects designated for divine worship by dedication or blessing are to be treated reverently. They are not to be employed for profane or inappropriate use (can. 1171). Regarding large buildings, the code says they lose their dedication or blessing if they have been destroyed in large part, or if they have been turned over permanently to profane use (can. 1212).

But the code does not directly answer a very practical question many Catholics have: “What do I do with a broken rosary, a tarnished medal, or a deteriorating statue?”

In the past, the Vatican has offered several different solutions. If possible, put the object to some other sacred use. If not, burn it, melt it, or bury it. Try to avoid letting the object enter secular or profane use.

If you have old religious articles at home, you may bury them in the ground. When you do, you might read a passage from the Bible such as Revelation 21:1–5, which speaks about the passing away of a former world and the coming of something new. Recall the occasions you have used these items. Pray the Lord’s Prayer. Do it in a spirit of thankfulness for all that these objects have meant and out of respect for the sacred realities they have represented.


